

MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF TEANECK
HELD IN THE MUNICIPAL BUILDING ON TUESDAY, MARCH 3rd, 1931.

The Mayor called the meeting to order at 8:09 P.M. and on the roll call the following members responded: Mayor Karl D. Van Wagner, Councilmen Louis G. Morten, Samuel S. Paquin, Frederick T. Warner and Walter Ely.

A motion was made by Mr. Paquin, seconded by Mr. Morten, that the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting be dispensed with.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

The following communications were received:

Communication from Holy Name Hospital requesting that the closing hour of the miniature golf course near the hospital be established at 11 P.M.

Mayor referred this communication to the Township Manager, requesting that Mr. Volcker acknowledge receipt and get in touch with the owner of the golf course to take the matter up with him.

Communication from No. Jersey Title Insurance Co. re an assessment of \$130. on West Englewood Drainage Area, which was not included in the search No. 7511 furnished by Mr. Graffin under date of May 27th, 1927.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Warner, that the Township Manager get in touch with Mr. Graffin to secure all the details in regard to this matter and to report to the Committee thereon at their next meeting.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Communication from No. Jersey Title Insurance Co. re amount of \$33.75 for Eastern Sewer which was omitted from search #13787 and continuation search #14130. Mr. Connor advised the Title Insurance Co. of this amount outstanding, but they were unable to collect the amount from their client.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Warner, that this communication take the same course as the previous communication.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Communication from Hackensack Valley Sewerage Commission that they will sit at the Englewood City Hall on Tuesday evening, March 10th, 1931, at 8:30 P.M. and inviting the officials and any other persons interested to this meeting.

Mayor suggested that Mr. Volcker get in touch with Mr. Weiner inviting him to attend this meeting.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that Mr. Volcker invite Mr. Weiner to attend this meeting with the members of the Council who could attend.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Communication from John F. Soby complaining of the service of the Englewood Hackensack bus line.

This communication had been acknowledged by Mr. Volcker and reply received from Mr. Soby stating what a wonderful satisfaction it is to have such prompt action in the matter of improving our bus service between Englewood and West Englewood. Mr. Brady had called Mr. Soby expressing a desire to cooperate in removing any short-comings of the company.

Received and filed.

Communication from Frank A. Morrison in re Macaroni vs. Township of Teaneck, stating that the decision of the Court upon the certiorari and application holds that since Mr. Duffy, through his attorney, was familiar with all of the steps taken in connection with the certiorari and since the cause had been permitted by the applicant to take its course as between the parties of record, that now that it had reached its culmination it is too late for him to interpose objections which should have been made with diligence and promptness.

Received and filed.

Communication from A. Edmondston, of 996 Grace Terrace, complaining of the muddy condition of Grace Terrace.

Referred to Township Manager.

Township Manager's Reports

Mr. Volcker presented reports of the various Departments.

Report of Township Clerk - \$76.80 for 5% bus franchise tax.

Report of Tax Collector for February, showing total amount received for Taxes, \$42,453.77 - total amount received on assessments, \$62,722.51. Mr. Volcker reported that the interest collected for February was \$1606. which was slightly under the amount estimated, but that January was ahead so that we were still ahead on that one item.

Report of Fire Department for month of February showing total number of alarms, 31, of which 21 were brush fires.

Discussion was held on the matter of brush fires, and a motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, and carried, that this matter be referred to the Chief of the Fire Department to see if there isn't some way by which these brush fires can be reduced in number, and that this matter then be referred to the Public Safety Committee for their recommendations.

Report of Public Works Department showing total amount collected for permits, etc., \$71.75.

Report of Building Inspector from February 3rd to February 27th, showing total valuations, \$142,410.00. Total Fees, \$355.00 - 50% due Township, \$177.50.

Mr. Warner wanted to know if the affidavits were being acknowledged to which Mr. Volcker replied that to the best of his knowledge they were.

On Route #4, there was a Committee from the Township, both official and unofficial, before the State Highway Commission today. It so happened that Captain Wilkins, who was in Trenton last week, found it was decidedly active and by his presence there headed off a decision until today when they agreed to hold a hearing. Councilman Morten and I were down representing the Township, and a good many of the interested property owners were there, Captain Wilkins was there and Mr. Sippel. The hearing lasted about five or ten minutes. Capt. Wilkins presented the case for the Township to the effect that the plan as finally adopted or arrived at after long consultations with the Township was looked upon as a contract between the Township and the State Highway; that the plan which the engineers proposed to submit to substitute for the original plan was an inferior plan, by their own admission. Construction engineer admitted it was inferior, and said it was merely a matter of cost. The Commission said to bring in to them or get together with Mr. Neumart, and present a sheet showing the land costs of the original plan and the land costs of the revised plan, and if there is no material difference we will assure you that the original plan will proceed.

Mr. Morten - The plan that they proposed was just exactly at right angles to what we agreed we were to have when we finally yielded to the suggestion of the Commission on having the embankments passing through the middle of our Township. The first proposal was to have high embankment, and after considerable discussion and having benefit on part of Township and Taxpayer's engineers, and the Commission, we finally after we couldn't persuade them to cross at present grade, yielded to embankment of about 7'. Now without any notice to the Township, without any notice to the parties interested, so far as we know, after change in engineers, the present Engineers want to replace that embankment from 7' to some 10' or 11' and instead of having ramps proceed along Teaneck Road which would give us somewhat of a desirable condition, they were going to have ramps run at right angles which was undesirable. I think we may be able to persuade Commission to adhere to original plan which was conceded by all to be the best for the interests of the Township even though it may be somewhat more costly, but the Township has yielded to the State after making the first suggestion that they should pass around the northern boundary of the Township, and we feel that that concession is certainly worthy of some consideration and should not be made a matter of mere dollars and cents to the detriment of the Township.

Mr. Volcker - In regard to the Poor Farm property, I have received a communication from the Board of Chosen Freeholders enclosing an opinion from the County Counsel to the effect that this Board may enter into an agreement looking to the use by the Township of this land for recreational purposes, until such times as the County has need of this land for its active use for County purposes.

I don't think we should allow the impression to get abroad that we are going to put anything elaborate in there. Mr. Morrison will examine that to find out if by taking this over as park property are we destroying whatever little chance we might have of collecting taxes.

After a little discussion on this matter, it was decided to hold this matter in abeyance and to investigate it further.

Notice has been received from the Board of Chosen Freeholders that a Psychopathic Ward has been opened at the Bergen County Home (Almshouse) Oradell, N. J., and hereafter all mental cases for observation, instead of being taken to the County Jail, shall be taken to the Psychopathic Ward. This will be referred to the Police Chief.

Following suggestion made at last meeting that an official of Brewster and Company and residents of Garrison avenue be called into conference, we finally arranged for such a meeting here in this Town Hall last Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The meeting lasted until some time after five. I might say that the residents north of the cut, I don't think they were represented at all. Brewster had gone in there and cleaned up the street and put in a cinder path. From section south and from Sagamore Avenue there were about twenty people to meet with Mr. Boland. Mr. Boland would not promise to build a road in back of the houses, stating that the cost of building such a road with the ground conditions was entirely prohibitive for the amount of material that was in the cut and for the price they were getting for it. He did agree to flush the street and to take off the broom sweeper which he had there.

Mayor - Flushing the street into the sewers?

Mr. Volcker - It means flushing into the sewers and cleaning it out again. He agrees to do that.

Mr. Fagan - I was at that meeting and there was nothing agreed.

Mr. Volcker - Mr. Boland agreed to flush the street, take off the sweeper and to send an adjuster around into the houses of any person who had a claim to see whether the damage had been caused by the trucks, and if so what the amounts were. Although Mr. Boland agreed that he would do this very thing, the people naturally were not satisfied with the things which he promised or agreed to do and demanded that the trucks be taken off the street which, naturally, Brewster refused to do, and that is about where the conference ended.

Mayor - Did he reiterate how long he will be there?

Mr. Volcker - He said he had 12,500 yards to take out, not including the cut in Garrison Avenue. That cut across Garrison Avenue itself is part of his contract which he has left in there until the last. There may be another \$5,000. additional yards in that cut. He is taking it out at rate of about 1,000 yards a day. About 17 working days from last Saturday.

You will remember the Council passed the trucking ordinance on second reading last meeting on the theory that there was all to gain and nothing to lose, which was perfectly proper. Last Thursday or Friday a Mr. Crawford came up to investigate the situation. I drove him around, particularly over Brewster's work, and he personally expressed his sympathy for the people. He told me that he would take it up at a meeting today, and asked for some other maps, which I sent him. This afternoon a call came from Trenton from the Secretary of the Traffic Commission, and he said the Commission met this afternoon and went all over your ordinance and called in their solicitor and solicitor of State Highway Commission, and between the two solicitors they decided Traffic Commission didn't have anything to do with this ordinance, and they passed it back to the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles. Reason was that the Motor Vehicle Commission, which had full authority in this up to some months ago, never approved the ordinance of 1927, and they didn't approve it because they didn't get it. The Law only went into effect in 1928. After the Law went into effect the ordinance wasn't sent down for approval.

Mayor - What is the status, is it or is it not an ordinance?

Mr. Volcker - It is an ordinance, but it is not effective.

Mr. Paquin - Can it be made effective by now submitting that ordinance passed in 1927?

Mr. Volcker - According to what I heard over the 'phone, yes. He said that the attorney for the Motor Vehicle Commission claimed that the Motor Vehicle Commission had power over it.

Mayor - It has been referred to the Motor Vehicle Commission?

Mr. Volcker - Yes, where we sent it first.

Mayor - Didn't they claim upon its receipt that they had word from the attorney general that such an ordinance had not been received?

Mr. Volcker - That Attorney General business has been considerably confused. The Traffic Commission said that the Attorney General had advised them that they had power over all uses of streets. That is all that they said. His province is not to pass on municipal ordinances, but just to advise the State Departments.

Mr. Paquin - Do you know from practice, or in general, or from records in the files, whether when the law was passed in 1928, which should have resulted in reference to the Motor Vehicle Commission, whether the Township was notified that the Motor Vehicle Commission had the right to see and pass on such an ordinance?

Mr. Volcker - They would not necessarily have been notified.

Mr. Paquin - It was a case of oversight.

Mr. Volcker - Among the number of streets in Town which have been in terrible shape, there have been streets in which there was no use of putting cinders just to be churned up with the mud to no effect. Thing that they needed was a stone base. Of course it is impossible to put stone base in when you have to pay \$2.25 for crushed stone. It is fortunate to have State Highway go through where there was considerable stone, and after some communication with the State Highway Department getting their permission to use the stone, we made arrangements whereby Brewster will truck and spread the stone at \$3.50 for a five yard load. We scraped the streets and put this bottom in. There are four streets built and it is making a satisfactory job. Twelve feet wide is all we are putting in. It will be about 30 or 40¢ per foot. We can't cover every street, just where it is most needed. Aside from that, in other streets we have placed a fairly large quantity of cinders. The complaint on Grace Terrace has been partly attended to, but will receive still further attention.

After canvassing the bids which came in for oil and gas at the last meeting, I recommend as being the best bid for oil, the Silent Automatic Sales Company, with 1/4 cent below the market price and as protection against 7¢ maximum price. For gasoline the Standard and Tydol were both the same with 2¢ below tank wagon price to dealers. The successful bidder was determined by lot in favor of the Tydol Company, and I recommend the award of the contract to the Public Service

Oil Company who represents Tydol, their checks to be retained, the checks of the unsuccessful bidders to be returned.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that the recommendation of the Township Manager be approved, and that the Township Manager be authorized to enter into proper and sufficient contract accordingly.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Mr. Volcker reported that he had received the resignation of Dr. Mangelsdorf from the Health Advisory Board.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Warner, that Dr. Mangelsdorf's resignation be accepted.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Mr. Volcker - The physicians who are serving on the Health Board have been appointed as the official Township doctors instead of doctor, under the same conditions and rates as to compensation. Any one of them can act in the capacity of Township doctor.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that the action of the Township Manager be approved.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Bogota Water Company has applied for an increase in rates. I am frank to admit that what we are paying now for the hydrants is a low rate. I don't know whether the increase they ask for to \$65.00 a hydrant, which is considerably less than we are paying for other hydrants, is justifiable or not. The President of the Company met with the Finance Board last Friday and went into some details. I received these figures yesterday. I called Bogota authorities tonight and they have not yet approved it. I suggest we work with the Bogota Council and report to Council as soon as possible.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that the suggestion be concurred in.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Mr. Volcker reported that there are five street lights on Fort Lee Road and that the Township of Teaneck pays for all five lights. He wrote to Bogota asking them to pay for half of these lights and received a reply that their budget has been approved and adopted and that there is no provision in same to take care of any more lights.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Warner, that the communication be received and filed, but that the Township Manager be directed to ascertain whether that is a permanent arrangement or a temporary arrangement due to the fact that the present budget does not include it.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Mr. Volcker - As to meeting with Bell Telephone Company, we corresponded with the Vice-President this time and asked him whether he would not come up. He says he is quite familiar with the matter and has given a good deal of time to it personally within the last two years. He dislikes to take the matter out of Mr. McGowan's hands, since he feels that Mr. McGowan has handled it very creditably. Mr. McGowan called and stated he would be glad to come to any meeting we might designate.

Mr. Morten - There are a good number of people interested. We will see if we can't arrange a meeting in the very near future at which time this matter can be taken up and discussed and see if solution can be arrived at.

Mr. Volcker - I have finally received an answer from Wright, Vanderburgh and McCarthy on the tax title matters that they have. There are thirteen distinct and separate parcels on which amount of work has been done. There is \$2409. of cost involved up to the present in foreclosing titles. I have them plotted out on the map and they are in Bogota and Manhattan Heights sections. It is matter I would like to take up with attorney to see what his advice is in discontinuing them.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Ely, referring this matter to the Township Manager for investigation and report.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Mr. Volcker - The last matter is just to note the fact that Mr. Pearson and I attended the mid-winter meeting of the N. J. State League of Municipalities where live subjects were discussed by the members. Quite a few interesting subjects were taken up which were pertinent to Teaneck.

RESOLUTIONS

A resolution was offered by Mr. Ely, #429, apportioning the paving assessment of \$205.00, N. E. Sewers of \$115.00 and Storm Drain of \$31.00 on Block 436, lots 40 and 40A.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that the resolution be adopted.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Warner, #430, apportioning the Addition to West Sewer Assessment, \$25.00, on Block 561, lots 153 and 153-A.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Ely, that the resolution be adopted.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Ely, #431, authorizing an additional refund of \$1.00 to M. Massano on Block 238-A, lot 13.

A motion was made by Mr. Paquin, seconded by Mr. Morten, that the resolution be adopted.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Morten, #432, appointing an Advisory Board on Charity to consist of the following members - Robert A. Shaw, Charles A. Wild, G. J. Bonneville, N. E. Peieff and Frank S. DeRonde.

A motion was made by Mr. Paquin, seconded by Mr. Warner, that the resolution be adopted.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Morten, #433, appointing an Advisory Board on the Building Code, to consist of the following members - B. Francis McGuire, F. T. Hatch, George Fox, J. A. McCarroll and E. J. Hazard.

A motion was made by Mr. Warner, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that the resolution be adopted.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

A Decision was read by Mr. Morten re the appeal of George Dowd from the Decision of the Township Manager which stated that after a careful and conscientious study and review of the entire case, in order that the Council might do justice to the accused and perform their duties as Councilmen in a fair and impartial manner, they have reached the conclusion unanimously that the action of the Township Manager was fully justified. The appeal of George Dowd will, therefore, be dismissed, and he is dismissed from the Police Department of Teaneck.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that the decision of Council be filed.

On roll call Councilmen voted as follows: Mayor Van Wagner, Councilmen Morten, Paquin and Ely - Aye. Councilman Warner - Not voting inasmuch as he is not familiar with the case.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that Mr. Warner be excused from voting on the decision.

On roll call Councilmen voted as follows: Mayor Van Wagner, Councilmen Morten, Paquin and Ely - Aye.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Morten, #434, affirming the decision of the Township Manager in dismissing the said George Dowd, and dismissing the appeal of George Dowd.

A motion was made by Mr. Paquin, seconded by Mr. Ely, that the resolution be adopted.

On roll call Councilmen voted as follows: Mayor Van Wagner, Councilmen Morten, Paquin and Ely - Aye. Councilman Warner - Not voting.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that Mr. Warner be excused from voting.

On roll call Councilmen voted as follows: Mayor Van Wagner, Councilmen Morten, Paquin and Ely - Aye.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Paquin, that a copy of the Decision and a copy of the resolution be sent to the Counsel for the accused.

On roll call all Councilmen voting in favor and none against, motion was declared carried.

Mr. Howard Fagan - We had a meeting with Brewster's representatives here Saturday afternoon and it was understood that it was purely a matter who would pay for this road to relieve the people who are living in the district around Sagamore. Mr. Boland intimated to one of the men they would gladly use this road if we paid for it. Now during the discussion relating to this high embankment on the other part of Teaneck, Mr. Morten brought out the question of protecting the people living in that area. We are deserving of some protection. Mr. Boland is using our street for a financial gain. We are asking for Council's protection from a sanitary standpoint, because it isn't a fit place to live in with the conditions down there. We brought up question perhaps of re-routing the trucks or covering them up. Unless we can get the Council to give us some protection, we are going to band together and handle the matter ourselves. It will have to be done because this hauling is going to carry on for many months. After they get through hauling dirt they will haul cement and sand to build the road. Mr. Boland admitted that last Saturday afternoon. I hope Committee will do something.

Mr. Warner - I have this in mind. I think the Committee wants to do something. They are looking for suggestions. Have you anything to suggest to govern the wagons?

Mr. Fagan - From a sanitary standpoint, it is an unfit condition for homes and children and families.

Mr. Warner - We are trying to work it out, and if anybody has any suggestion we will consider it.

Mr. Brockmeyer - Saturday afternoon Boland agreed it was unsightly. We suggested that the trucks be taken along the right-of-way to the proposed Windsor Road and to the bridge similar as it is on this side. They claimed their engineers said it was impossible from a financial standpoint. Why couldn't the Township delegate the Township Engineer to find out if that ground is so swampy it will cost \$10,000. to put a road through there. He says that they have eight months more of that carting. I know the section along the Windsor Road right-of-way is not swampy and there may be some places, but I think the road is perfectly passable. I don't know why we should accept Brewster's report. We have a Township Engineer and I don't see why he shouldn't make a report.

Mr. Morten - Suppose our Township Engineer said it could be done for \$9,000. We have no assurance it could be done.

Mr. Brockmeyer - I don't think he would do it if it cost \$50. The only thing he agreed to was it was unfortunate. He also made a statement he was going to use that road regardless of anybody, even the courts.

Mayor - He is surer of that than we are.

Mr. Warner - Our attorney isn't here, but if we did just put a policeman there and tell them to make other arrangements, what is our liability?

Mr. Morten - They will go to court and get an injunction and stop us.

Mayor - I am in favor of doing anything to give the people relief.

Mr. Paquin - Especially if attitude of Brewster is as Mr. Brockmeyer has stated, an attitude of defiance.

Mr. Morten - Necessary time has elapsed to make the ordinance become effective.

A motion was made by Mr. Morten, seconded by Mr. Warner, that the ordinance be considered as effective, and that Brewster be notified that we will station an officer there and that we will not permit streets designated as not open for heavy trucking to be used.

On roll call all Councilmen voted as follows: Mayor Van Wagner, Councilmen Morten, Warner and Paquin - Aye. Councilman Ely - Not voting.

Mayor - He told us he had approximately two weeks' work at the time we had discussion with him.

Mr. Brockmeyer - They expect to carry dirt about two months and that we had eight months more before us.

Mayor - Possibly he was more informed when he spoke with you.

Mr. Fagan - They are looking forward to getting all the contracts for finishing up of that road. They intend to use those roads and they are pretty sure of getting those contracts.

Mr. Brockmeyer - At one point trucks come around the corner and they don't come around slow; sometimes large pieces of stone land on the sidewalk or the strip of grass. I asked Mr. Boland what would happen if child was there and he said it would be just too bad.

Mr. Carl Scharnweber, 957 Garrison Avenue - I live at the corner where rocks fall off. As far as adjuster, if anyone sends in a complaint they will send an adjuster, but not unless you complain.

Mr. Morten - Are you gentlemen willing to cooperate with us in case suit is instituted?

Mr. Scharnweber - We also brought up question of road on the east side of the track and the Township laid out a route on each side of the track and on the west side they figured it was marshy land and they would go ahead with the one on the east side but not on the west side.

Mr. Brockmeyer - That bridge across Railroad has been posted to hold 12 tons. His trucks weigh between 27,000 and 28,000 pounds.

Mr. Morten - That belongs to the railroad.

Mr. Brockmeyer - Railroad posted it was limited to loads not over 12 ton. According to Mr. Boland's statement, the loads are between 13 and 14 tons.

Mr. Morten - That is a private bridge.

Mr. Brockmeyer - Citizens of the Township are using it.

Mr. Morten - I am afraid we might get into trouble if we started to do anything there.

Mr. Ely requested information on Mr. Morrison's bill in the amount of \$485.00, and Mayor showed him the voucher which listed in detail the services rendered.
